



VENUES, TRAVEL & TIMINGS

Sessions take place in Chiswick House in Burlington Lane, W4; St Michael & All Angels Church & Parish Hall, Arts Educational Schools (ArtsEd); The Tabard Theatre (and pub) in Bath Road, W4; and Chiswick Library at 1 Duke's Avenue, W4 2AB. 


