Anthony Burgess: Why No Blue Plaque in Chiswick?



English Heritage has again turned down a bid for a blue plaque on the Chiswick home of writer **Anthony Burgess**.

Burgess is best known for his dystopian novel A Clockwork Orange and lived at 24 Glebe Street (above)

between 1963 and 1968, where he wrote several of his most important novels and other works.

Professor Andrew Biswell, director of the International Anthony Burgess Foundation, said: "Anthony Burgess was one of the major British writers of the 20th century, but his achievements have gone largely unrecognised in the country of his birth. When English Heritage turned down our first application in 2015, they said we could re-nominate him after five years, rather than the usual ten. His international reputation has grown since then, so we are very surprised and disappointed."

The news was announced ahead of a debate on blue plaques at the Chiswick Book Festival - on the day that a plaque was unveiled on the Hampstead home of **Jim Henson**, creator of The Muppets.
