All events last one hour unless otherwise stated.

Venues

On Friday, Saturday and Sunday, we have reduced the number of venues and all our events take place within five minutes' walk from Turnham Green tube station: at **St Michael & All Angels Church & Parish Hall** (Bath Road, Chiswick, W4 1TT) and **Theatre at the Tabard** (2 Bath Road, W4 1LW). Our Sunday film screening is at **The Chiswick Cinema** (94-96 Chiswick High Road, W4 1SH) which is 8 minutes walk away from the station.

Some sessions take place slightly further afield: on Wednesday 9th September at the **George IV pub** in the Boston Room (185 Chiswick High Road, W4 2DR); on Thursday September 10th at **Chiswick House & Gardens** (Burlington Lane, W4 2RP); and on Monday 14th at **Hogarth's House** (Hogarth Lane, Great West Rd W4 2QN); Our **Writers Walks** start at the Café, Chiswick House &

Gardens W4 2RP; Strand Café, 109 Strand on the Green, W4 3NQ; and Chiswick Park tube station. See details and map on website.

Accessibility

The Chiswick Book Festival actively supports the 'Wheelchair Happy' campaign which aims to improve accessibility at public venues in Chiswick. **The Garden Pavilion at Chiswick House, St Michael & All Angels Church and Parish Hall, the George IV, The Chiswick Cinema and Hogarth's House** have full disabled access. **Theatre at the Tabard** is accessed by a staircase and unfortunately does not have a lift. Turnham Green (District Line) is the nearest tube station. Buses go along Bath Road, Chiswick High Road, Turnham Green Terrace and Southfield Road. Parking: free north of the Bath Road on Saturday and Sunday; on meters towards Chiswick High Road (some 4-hour meters).

Coffee and home-made cakes will be sold outside the Parish Hall. Drinks will be on sale before the evening sessions at the **George IV, Chiswick House and Hogarth's House**; in the **Church & Parish Hall** on Friday and Saturday; and at **The Chiswick Cinema** on Sunday. 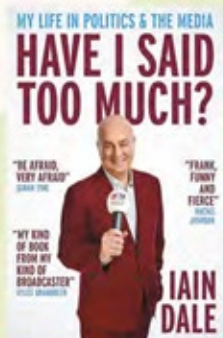


3pm: **Georgina Moore: River of Stars**

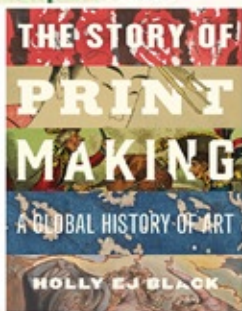
4.30pm: Screening: *Quartermaine's Terms* by Simon Gray

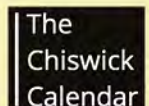
